**MINUTES OF THE JOINT SAC & SIMBAG MICROFINANCE ANNUAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

**“Renewing our Mission to Empower the Poor in a Time of Crisis”**

**I. Preliminaries**

The Joint SAC & Simbag Microfinance Annual General Assembly began with an opening prayer led by Fr. Wilson B. Bejo Jr. II, Simbag Microfinance Spiritual Director, followed by the singing of the Philippine National Anthem. Ms. Salvi Rufina Angela M. Morcoso, Simbag Microfinance Trustee and Overall Moderator, acknowledged all present, both in person and via remote communication, including the automatic, regular, and auxiliary members, Board of Trustees, Management, and Officers (attached herewith is the attendance sheet).

**II. Welcome Remarks**

Fr. Eric B. Martillano, SAC Executive Director, delivered the Welcome Remarks. He stated that the gathering is a convergence of hearts, hands, and hopes committed to promoting dignity, equality, and the common good. Beyond reviewing accomplishments, the assembly serves as an opportunity to renew the commitment to the mission of serving communities through healthcare, education, livelihood, protection, empowerment, ecology, and disaster response.

He highlighted the collective efforts of SAC and its partners in providing nutrition support, medical assistance, educational opportunities, livelihood programs through Simbag Microfinance, leadership development, protection of vulnerable sectors, environmental stewardship, and assistance to those affected by crises and calamities. These initiatives form a strong network of support that helps communities not just survive but thrive.

Fr. EB Martillano underscored three (3) core principles of social development and community empowerment: (1) loving poor communities without communities, placing people at the center of development by ensuring their active participation in all programs and projects. (2) building bridges through partnerships and collaborations to expand outreach and impact, and (3) recognizing that every gesture of service and compassion contributes to meaningful change.

He concluded by expressing gratitude to the SAC workers, volunteers, community partners, donors, allies, and to Bp. Joel Z. Baylon for the unwavering support. He encouraged everyone to remain steadfast in their shared mission of serving and empowering communities.

1 **III. Opening Message**

2

3 Most Rev. Joel Z. Baylon, D.D., Bishop of Legazpi, began his opening message by reflecting on  
4 the Pastoral Letter entitled *“Imploring the Aid of Almighty God.”* He emphasized that the  
5 Diocese’s initiatives should become concrete expressions of a synodal Church – one that  
6 listens, discerns, and walks together – and bear lasting fruit from the grace of the Diocesan  
7 Diamond Jubilee celebration.

8

9 Drawing from the Preamble of the 1987 Philippine Constitution, which invokes God’s  
10 guidance in nation-building, Bp. JZ Baylon expressed concern over the increasing disregard of  
11 the moral values in public life. He cited persistent issues such as corruption, disinformation,  
12 abuse of power, weak accountability, and growing dependence on political patronage, all of  
13 which hinder genuine development and disproportionately affect the poor.

14

15 He likewise highlighted local concerns within the diocese and province, noting how  
16 unchecked power contributes to corruption, delayed public services, lost opportunities, and  
17 greater hardship among communities.

18

19 In response to these challenges, Bp. JZ Baylon called on the faithful to:

20

- 21 1. Pray and Seek Conversion by encouraging personal and communal conversion, spiritual  
22 renewal, and the regular recitation of the Nation’s Prayer for Enlightenment, Conversion,  
23 and Renewal in parishes and communities;
- 24 2. Form Conscience and Discern Truth by promoting Christian-based formation and  
25 discernment sessions on good citizenship through schools, parishes, families, and  
26 communities to help individuals discern truth from falsehood, uphold moral values, and  
27 live one’s faith in daily social and political life; and
- 28 3. Participate in Works of Solidarity and Reform by extending assistance to those affected  
29 by economic hardship and the impact of Mayon Volcano through outreach programs,  
30 livelihood initiatives, and social services. He also encouraged support for advocacy efforts  
31 promoting political reforms, accountability, democratic participation, and good  
32 governance, including educational campaigns related to anti-political dynasty initiatives.

33

34 Bp. JZ Baylon further urged the faithful to remain vigilant in demanding integrity,  
35 transparency, and accountability from public officials and all individuals serving the  
36 community, including those within the Church.

37

38 In closing, Bp. JZ Baylon entrusted the nation, province, and diocese to the maternal care of  
39 Our Lady of Salvation and encouraged everyone to continually implore the aid of Almighty  
40 God, trusting in His providence and unwavering care for His people.

1 **IV. Keynote Message**

2

3 Ms. Noemi Bonaobra, Simbag Microfinance Consultant, introduced the keynote speaker, Mr.  
4 Phillip L. Ong, President of Santeh Aquaculture Science & Technology Foundation. Inc.

5

6 In his message, Mr. Ong reflected on the humble beginnings of the enterprise hatchery  
7 established in Legazpi City on July 16, 2015. He emphasized that the success of the initiative  
8 is not merely about the products being sold but about the mission and dedication of the  
9 people behind the Simbag. Drawing from the lessons of pandemic, he encouraged everyone  
10 to continue building on what has been started and to work towards a shared vision guided by  
11 the key principles:

12

- 13 1. Think Community. Mr. Ong highlighted the community-based swine production program,  
14 “Babuyang Walang Amoy,” which helped protect growers from the impact of African  
15 Swine Fever (ASF). The initiative later evolved into what is now known as “clean pork”,  
16 demonstrating the value of collaboration in production, processing, quality assurance,  
17 and distribution. He emphasized the importance of community outreach and the  
18 provision of affordable, locally produced food for families and communities. He also cited  
19 the facility established in Anislag Parish as more than just a physical structure; it serves as  
20 a regional center and stands as a testament to the collective efforts, innovation, and  
21 commitment of its partners and stakeholders.
- 22 2. Think Region. He emphasized the need to expand initiatives beyond Legazpi City and  
23 strengthen agricultural collaboration across the region. Noting that livestock are sourced  
24 from neighboring provinces such as Sorsogon, he encouraged stakeholders to pursue  
25 scalable agricultural ventures and broaden their networks. He shared that Santeh, in  
26 partnership with Simbag Microfinance, is exploring camote (sweet potato) production as  
27 a potential growth opportunity. He emphasized the importance of expanding activities  
28 and forging partnerships to address the challenges brought about by inflation and rising  
29 production costs.
- 30 3. Think Global. Mr. Ong underscored the impact of global developments on local agriculture  
31 and food production. He explained how international trade restrictions and supply chain  
32 disruptions, particularly involving key feed ingredients such as methionine, can  
33 significantly affect the country’s agricultural sector. He urged participants to remain  
34 aware of the global trends and their potential implications for local food security,  
35 agricultural sustainability, and production systems.

36

37 In conclusion, Mr. Ong quoted Pope Francis words: “With hearts united in Christ, we can  
38 create a social miracle, let us build a kingdom of love and justice.” He encouraged everyone  
39 to continue working together, embrace innovation, and strengthen community, regional, and  
40 global perspectives in pursuit of sustainable development. He emphasized that collective  
41 actions, collaboration, and a shared commitment to common good are essential in addressing  
42 present challenges and building a more sustainable future for all.

1 **V. Call to Order and Determination of Quorum**

2

3 Bp. JZ Baylon called the meeting to order. There being 98 out of 126 members present,  
4 representing 78% of the total membership, Ms. Joyce B. Besana, Simbag Microfinance  
5 Corporate Secretary, declared the presence of a quorum.

6

7 **VI. Reading and Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Assembly Held on May 31, 2025**

8

9 There being no comments or corrections, upon motion duly made by Mr. Jose Misael B.  
10 Moraleda and seconded by Msgr. Crispin B. Bernarte Jr., the General Assembly approved the  
11 minutes of the 31 May 2025 Joint SAC and Simbag Microfinance Annual General Assembly.

12

13 **VII. Ratification of Board Actions**

14

15 **A. SAC Board Actions**

16

17 Ms. Nancy Dizon, SAC Admin/HR/Compliance Officer, presented the following summary  
18 of the SAC Board actions in 2025 for ratification:

19

- 20 • Approval of the minutes and agenda of the meetings
- 21 • Approval of the Finance Committee report
- 22 • Approval of the 2025 Operational Plan
- 23 • Approval of the Financial Report as of November 2025
- 24 • Instruction to develop a concrete plan and provide Capital Expenditures (CAPEX) for  
25 the technical study of the Laudato Si Farm
- 26 • Approval of the Year-end/Christmas Bonus
- 27 • Approval to procure a new service vehicle.

28

29 There being no comments, the General Assembly ratified the actions of the SAC Board of  
30 Trustees.

31

32 **B. Simbag Microfinance Board Actions**

33

34 Ms. Marie Grace U. Lagana, Simbag Microfinance Management Support Officer and Board  
35 Secretariat, presented the summary of the Board actions covering resolutions approved  
36 during 2025 Board meetings for ratification with the following highlights:

- 38 • Approval of meeting agenda and minutes
- 39 • Approval of Board and Committee appointments
- 40 • Ratified Annual General Assembly preparations and governance matters
- 41 • Appointed new Board Treasurer and additional Audit Committee member

19  
20 Dr. Baby Boy Benjamin D. Nebres III moved for the ratification of the Board actions, with  
21 a recommendation that the corresponding resolution numbers be included in the report  
22 for the succeeding meeting. Motion was duly seconded by the General Assembly.

23  
24 **VIII. For Confirmation: 2025 Audited Financial Statements and Assignment of 2026 External**  
25 **Auditor**

26  
27 **A. SAC 2025 Audited Financial Statements and Assignment of 2026 External Auditor**

28  
29 Ms. Jane Ricafort, SAC Finance and Accounting Officer, presented the highlights of the  
30 2025 Audited Financial Statements, viz:

- 31
- 32 • Assets, Liabilities, and Equity - ₱74,879,290.21, a 2% decrease from 2024, due to the
- 33 early termination of CRS projects.
- 34 • Cash and Cash Equivalents - ₱5,653,367.30
- 35 • Receivables - ₱7,158,496.52.
- 36 • Short-Term Investments - ₱13,554,582.82, reflecting a 54% decrease from the
- 37 previous year due to their conversion into long-term investments.
- 38 • Non-Current Assets - ₱48,506,801.94, an increase of 20% from 2024.
- 39 • Property and Equipment - ₱726,592.72, representing a 6% decrease from 2024
- 40 • Investments - ₱47,780,209.22, a 20% increase
- 41 • Current Liabilities - ₱3,600,032.84, a significant decrease of 58% from the previous
- 42 year
- 43 • Fund Balance - ₱71,279,257.02, a slight increase of 0.38%.

- Net Savings registered a deficit of ₱267,320.07, reflecting a substantial decrease of 592% compared to 2024.
- Revenue - ₱14,889,874.80, a decrease of 21% from the previous year
- Program and Project Costs - ₱8,601,065.00, reflecting a 2% increase
- Personnel Expenses - ₱5,795,169.53, a decrease of 23%
- Administrative Expenses - ₱760,960.34, representing a 52% decrease from 2024.

Further, the external auditors expressed an unqualified opinion, stating that the accompanying financial statements fairly present, the financial position of Social Action Center – Diocese of Legazpi, Inc. as of December 31, 2025, as well as its financial performance and the cash flows for the period then ended, in accordance with the Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (PFRS for SEs).

Thereafter, Ms. J Ricafort sought the confirmation of the assignment of Napili, Bonacua & Associates, CPAs, as the external auditors for the 2026 financial statement.

The General Assembly unanimously confirmed the 2025 SAC Audited Financial Statements, and the assignment of Napili, Bonacua & Associates, CPAs, as the external auditors for the audit of the 2026 financial statement.

#### **B. Simbag Microfinance 2025 Audited Financial Statements and Assignment of 2026 External Auditor**

Ms. Jean Camela B. Bellen, Simbag Microfinance Internal Audit Staff II, presented the highlights of the 2025 Audited Financial Statements (AFS), viz:

- Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balance - ₱1.44 billion, a 10% increase from 2024, due to higher current assets and increased receivables from members.
- Cash and Cash Equivalents - decreased by 15%, as a result of the reclassification of funds to Short-Term Investments
- Comprehensive Income - ₱112.88 million, a 17% increase, attributed to strong microfinance operations and higher interest earnings.

Thereafter, Ms. Belen requested confirmation of the retention of BDO CMC as the external auditor for the 2026 financial statement.

There being no objection, the General Assembly confirmed the 2025 Audited Financial Statement of Simbag Microfinance, and approved the retention of the BDO CMC as the external auditor for the 2026 financial statements.

#### **IX. Performance Highlights and Future Directions**

1 The accomplishments of the Social Action Center (SAC) for CY 2025 were presented through  
2 a video presentation, highlighting the key milestones achieved under its seven advocacies,  
3 namely: Healthcare, Education, Livelihood, Protection, Empowerment, Ecology, and Disaster  
4 Risk Reduction (HELPED Programs).

5  
6 Among the notable accomplishments reported were the enrollment of 244 undernourished  
7 children in the Supplemental Feeding Program, with 147 children successfully graduating  
8 from the program; the generation of P7.2 million in savings through 32 Savings and Internal  
9 Lending Communities (SILC); the provision of shelter assistance to 3,600 households; and the  
10 distribution of P6.3 million worth of cash assistance, relief goods, and housing materials. The  
11 report likewise highlighted the training of more than 200 human rights defenders, the  
12 mobilization of over 2,000 citizens in support of justice and honest elections, and the planting  
13 of 1,104 trees, among other accomplishments.

14  
15 Moving forward, SAC expressed its commitment to further strengthen disaster preparedness  
16 initiatives, amplify advocacy and solidarity efforts, and empower the electorate.

17  
18 The accomplishments of Simbag Microfinance for CY 2025 were likewise presented through  
19 a video presentation. The report highlighted Simbag's continued commitment, as a  
20 development institution, to serving the microentrepreneurial poor through both financial and  
21 non-financial services. As of December 2025, Simbag served 103,899 members through its  
22 network of 10 branches and 35 Satellite Program Offices (SPOs), with total loan releases  
23 amounting to P2.6 billion and an outstanding loan portfolio of P1.0 billion.

24  
25 The report further noted that 29% of Simbag's outreach benefited from Members  
26 Development Services (MDS) programs, including scholarship assistance, school supplies  
27 assistance, medical missions, formation and training activities, and study-and-work-abroad  
28 opportunities. In addition, 94% of members were covered by insurance through SEDP MBA,  
29 with total insurance claims amounting to P33.5 million. Calamity assistance totaling P9.7  
30 million was likewise extended to 24,280 families affected by various disasters.

## 31 32 **X. Open Forum**

33  
34 Ms. SRAM Morcoso announced that the management will provide members with regular  
35 institutional updates through a newsletter or related reports. This initiative aims to keep  
36 members updated, encourage the exchange of ideas to further enhance SAC and Simbag's  
37 program and projects, and fostering a more collaborative and participative environment.

38  
39 Ms. Edna Cynthia S. Berces, Regional Director of DEPDev Region V, extended an invitation to  
40 SAC and Simbag Microfinance to join the Sustainable Development Special Regional  
41 Committee and the SDG Stakeholders Chamber. A group of private sector organizations aims  
42 to capture private sector contributions to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

1 **XI. Election and Announcement of the New Members of the Simbag Microfinance Board of**  
2 **Trustees**

3  
4 Bp. Baylon announced that an election will be held during the assembly in view of the end of  
5 terms of Ms. Salvi Rufina Angela M. Morcoso and Atty. Marylou D. Castillo, trustees of Simbag  
6 Microfinance. Per Simbag Microfinance By-laws, the automatic and regular members of the  
7 corporation, composed of clergy members, elect the members of the Board.

8

27 Bp. JZ Baylon proceeded with the announcement of the election results. The two incumbent  
28 trustees, namely Ms. Morcoso and Atty. Castillo were re-elected and shall continue to serve  
29 for another term.

30  
31 **XII. Closing Message**

32  
33 Fr. Rex Paul B. Arjona, President and CEO of Simbag Microfinance, expressed gratitude for  
34 the continued partnerships and reaffirmed the commitment of SAC Legazpi and Simbag  
35 Microfinance to addressing poverty through systematic, community-driven initiatives. He  
36 also recognized the four active development institutions in the Diocese of Legazpi,  
37 highlighting its uniqueness among local churches.

38  
39 Fr. RPB Arjona emphasized the concept of human agency, underscoring the importance of  
40 empowering individuals to participate meaningfully in their own development and  
41 community welfare. Reference to the teachings of Pope Francis and Pope Leo XIV,  
42 emphasizing a listening and journeying church that empowers human agency over  
43 institutional or technological control. He noted that human agency is often diminished by  
44 poverty, limited opportunities, underdeveloped capabilities, and corruption in public finance.


1 In response, SAC Legazpi and Simbag Microfinance remain committed to advancing initiatives  
2 that strengthen the capacity of individuals and communities to become active agents of  
3 development. He further recalled the renewed commitment made during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Diocesan  
4 Anti-Poverty Summit to address multifaceted poverty issues through collaborative actions.  
5 He emphasized that these efforts are supported by partnerships across livelihood enterprises,  
6 microfinance institutions, government agencies, private organizations, and social  
7 development sectors.

8  
9 Fr. RPB Arjona underscored Simbag Microfinance’s financial innovations in response to crises.  
10 He highlighted the *Simbag sa Krisis Package*, which provides zero-interest loans and flexible  
11 repayment options for entrepreneurs affected by economic disruptions. He further  
12 emphasized the importance of citizen education, good governance, and support for  
13 grassroots political reforms, reaffirming the Church’s dedication to collaborative, people-  
14 centered development and the pursuit of sustainable and inclusive transformation.


